




The American GI in Europe in World War II: The Battle In France

The final installment of a three-part history based on interviews with more than 200 World War II veterans, and often told in their own words, this book details the U.S. Army's battles in France following the D-Day landings in June 1944. Here are personal accounts of the paratroopers who regrouped after scattered air drops behind enemy lines; the soldiers who slogged inland from Omaha and Utah Beaches and battled through dense hedgerows for several brutal weeks following the landings; the troops who took Carentan, Cherbourg, St. Lô, and other towns and villages in Normandy; and the G.I.s who landed in southern France and began the hard drive north to meet their comrades. Rare archival photographs appear throughout the book, and sidebar articles provide in-depth information on the soldiers, their missions, and their weapons. 408.
